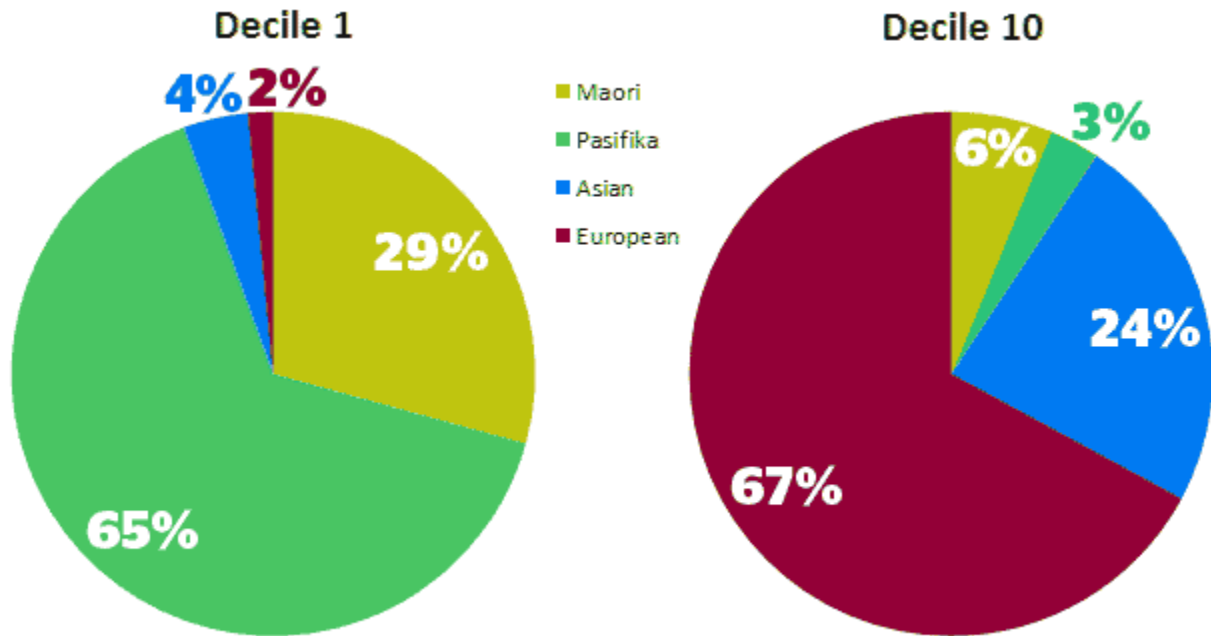


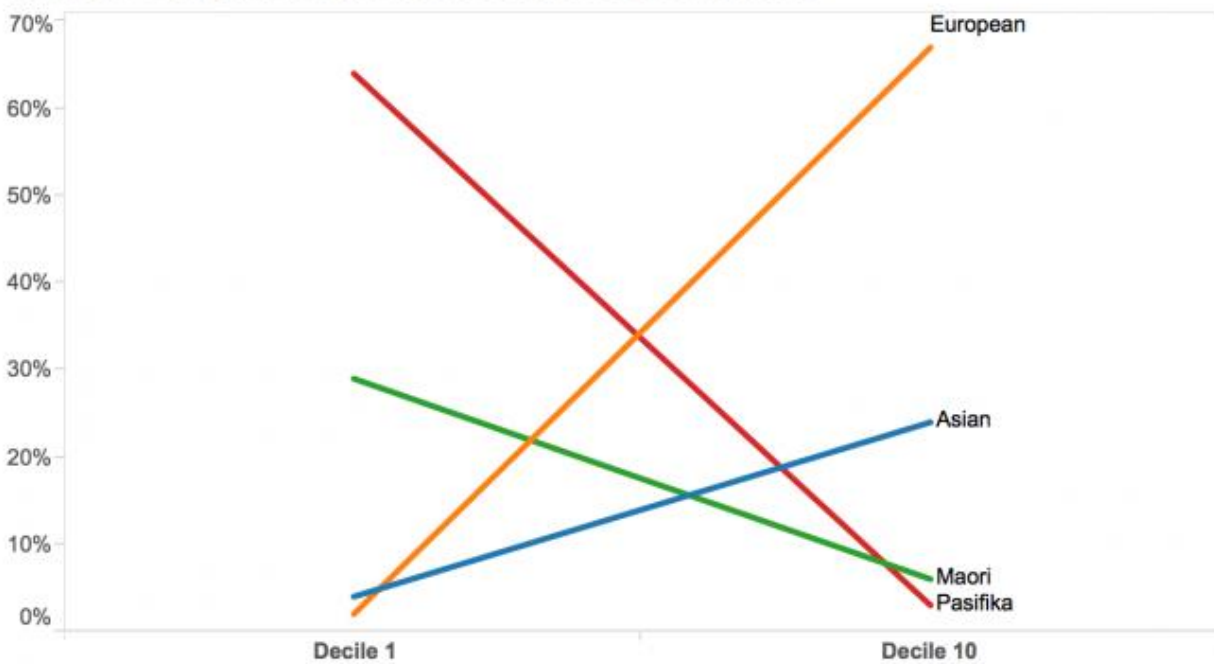
Sample One: Comparison of ethnicities at richest and poorest schools in Auckland

Ethnicities at poorest and richest schools in Auckland

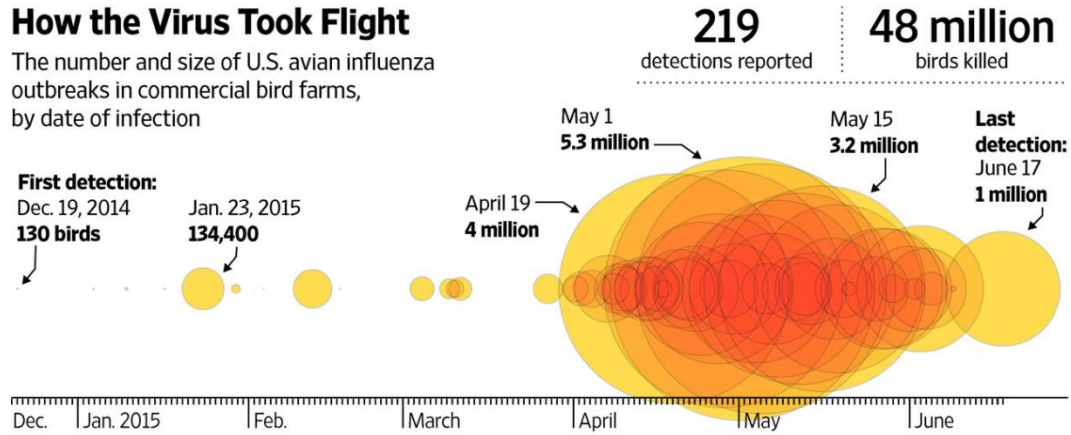

How the Virus Took Flight

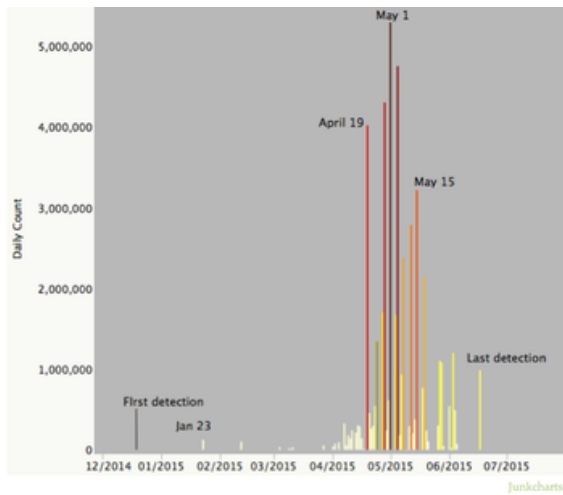
The number and size of U.S. avian influenza outbreaks in commercial bird farms, by date of infection

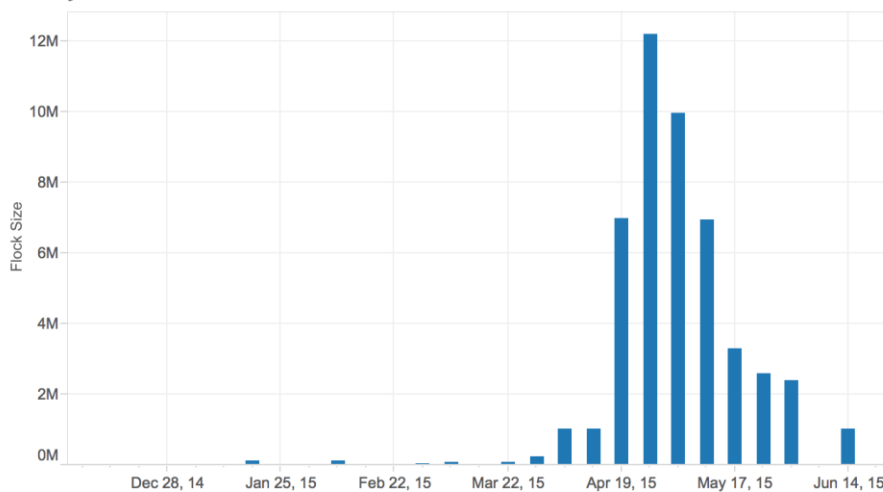

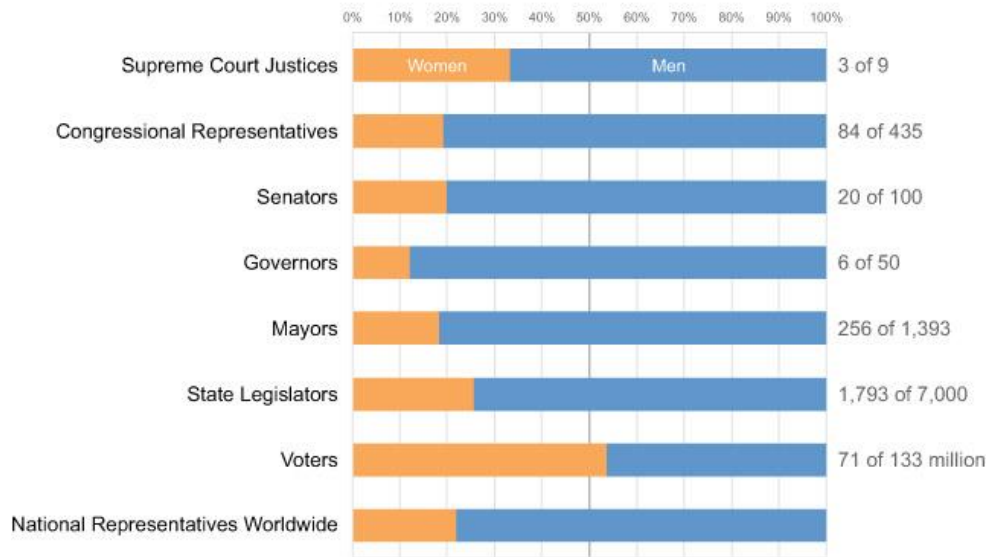

95 years after women got the right to vote, the U.S. government is still only about 20% female, with lowest representation among governors and mayors.

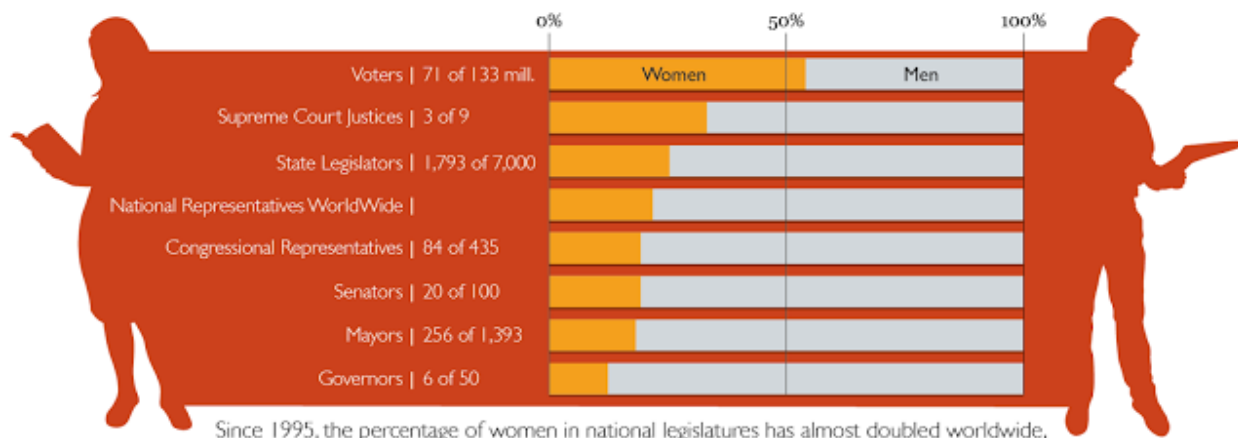

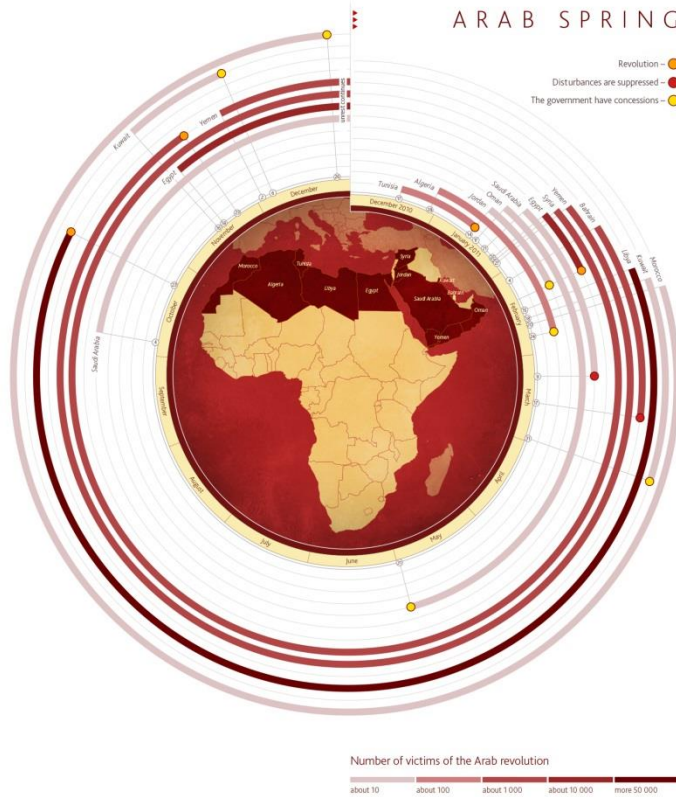

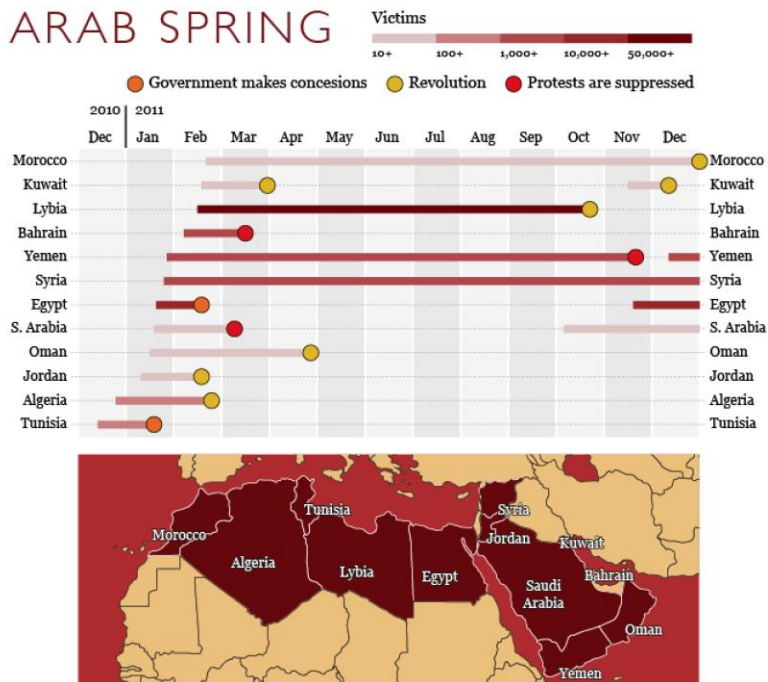
